



### Letter from the Director

Since its establishment in 1941, the National Archives Trust Fund (NATF) continues to provide administrative and financial support for programs and strategic initiatives of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) including but not limited to document reproduction services for our researcher community, records management training for government and private organizations, and financial stewardship of resources on behalf of NARA's Washington D.C. and field Archival sites, and NARA's Presidential Library system.

Overall, both the Presidential Library and National Archives Trust Funds posted positive results for Fiscal Year (FY) 2015. The National Archives Trust Fund continued to show a modest decline in orders for microfilm, digital, and paper reproductions while revenue generated through our Records Management Training programs rebounded to reflect strong results comparable to FY 2014. FY 2015 expenses related to Presidential Library operations increased during the year driven by significant capital improvements and museum exhibit updates made at the JFK Library as well as preliminary costs incurred for planned updates at the Ford and Nixon Presidential Libraries. On the administrative front, the responsibility for museum admission desk operations was transferred over the summer from the G.W. Bush Library Trust Fund to their respective Foundation, allowing both parties to improve efficiency and service for museum visitors. This operational change is currently being considered for other Presidential Libraries during FY 2016. Also planned for FY 2016 is the roll-out of a new electronic file delivery option for our researcher community, which will continue our goal of providing exceptional customer service and improved access to the holdings of the National Archives.

# Who We Are and What We Do

## Who We Are

The National Archives Trust Fund (NATF) was initially established by Congress to receive gifts or bequests to finance specific projects of the National Archives. Today, the NATF plays a much broader role in supporting the efficient and effective delivery of the NARA mission.

- **1941** Establishment of the NATF.
- **1948** Amendment allowing the NATF to collect proceeds from the sale of reproductions of records.
- 1955 The Presidential Libraries Act authorized the deposit of gifts and the proceeds from Presidential Library activities in Trust Fund accounts for each Presidential Library.
- 1984 The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) Act authorized the NATF to use, on a reimbursable basis, the services and employees of Federal Agencies, including NARA.

• **1986** – The Presidential Libraries Act required new Presidential Libraries to provide private endowments that are invested and managed by the Trust Fund.

## What We Do

The National Archives Trust Fund Board (NATFB) is authorized by 44 U.S.C. §§ 2112, 2307 to undertake tasks in support of NARA, including but not restricted to:

- Servicing requests by individual researchers for reproductions of records.
- Duplication of microfilm publications.
- **Operation** of Presidential Library museum admissions, gift shops, and eCommerce operations.
- Educational programs for genealogists, teachers, archivists and researchers.
- Records management training.
- Financial management of trust and gift fund transactions.
- Management of Presidential Library endowments and investment portfolios.



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## How We Did


### Overview

The NATF had a net income of \$3.5 million for fiscal year (FY) 2015 compared to a net income of \$7.7 million for FY 2014. Key components to our positive results this year included:

- \$170,000 (7%) increase in store merchandise sales.
- \$190,000 (21%) increase in records management training revenues.
- \$1.0 million (15%) decrease in salaries and benefits expenses.


Improved operating results increased our total assets by \$3.3 million in FY 2015. Liabilities decreased by \$247 thousand. Net position increased by \$3.5 million to \$40.9 million. Our total net position of \$40.9 million is composed of \$35.6 million spread across 13 individual Presidential Library Trust Funds and \$5.3 million for all other NATF operations.


### **Operating and Investment Revenue**

The NATF experienced an overall decrease in revenue for FY 2015 from FY 2014. The biggest decrease occurred in Presidential Library admissions. The largest increase occurred in investment income. Presidential Library admissions and reproduction service accounted for the majority of revenue earned.




## **Operating Expenses**

The NATF operating expenses increased by \$1.2 million between FY 2014 and FY 2015. An increase in *Consulting and Other Services* and *Supplies and Materials* accounted for the largest portion of the decrease. Salaries and benefits decreased by \$1.0 million.

### **Reproductions Volume**

Trust Fund order volume decreased 12% from FY 2014 to FY 2015 and has decreased by 33% since FY 2011. The NATF expects volume to continue its decline. However, the decline trend appears to be slowing.

The biggest drop in order volume has come from the reproduction of microform and court file records.

### Investments

The combined Trust and Gift Fund investment balance at the end of the fiscal year was \$68.5 million, consisting of \$50.3 million invested in securities held outside the U.S. Treasury and \$18.2 million invested in the U.S. Treasury. Total investment activity in FY 2015 was a gain of \$47 thousand, comprised of unrealized and realized gains and losses, and interest earned. Overall, the Trust Fund Presidential Libraries' investment portfolio experienced a loss of \$456 thousand. For the same period, Gift Fund investment activity experienced a combined income and increase in share value of \$503 thousand.

## What We Did

## Special Events

In FY 2015, the Special Events office provided more than 60,000 guests an opportunity to visit the National Archives in a private setting. Some of these events included the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Freedman's Bank, G20 Summit, the 800th Birthday of the Magna Carta, a symposium on the Declaration of Independence titled, "Punctuating Happiness," the 150th Anniversary of the United States Secret Service, the New Ten Dollar Bill in partnership with the Department of Treasury, and a Wikipedia Conference in partnership with Wikimedia.

The National Archives received the Grand Pinnacle Award, Silver from the International Festivals & Events Association.

### **Commercial Partnerships**



The Communications and Marketing Division is phasing out its program to develop and support partnership products designed to generate Trust Fund income and promote the holdings of the National Archives. Revenue was down over 50% compared to FY 2014.

## Iraqi Jewish Archives





The Iraqi Jewish Archives (IJA) website (<u>www.ija.archives.gov</u>) continues to receive a very positive response from viewers, who have provided additional information from their knowledge and experiences in Iraq. NARA updated the website in coordination with news related to the traveling exhibit.

Secretary of State John Kerry wrote to the Archivist of the United States in December 2015 "to commend the work of the National Archives and Records Administration...and [his] terrific team...on the Iraqi Jewish Archives (IJA)."

The traveling exhibit opened at the Richard Nixon Presidential Library and Museum, Yorba Linda, CA. The associated lecture series included three speakers during the course of the exhibition.

## What We Did (continued)

### **Records Management**

In FY 2015, the National Records Management Training (NRMT) program conducted 211 courses, trained over 4,900 individuals, and awarded 559 Certificates in Federal Records Management Training to Federal agency customers.


The NRMT developed an eLearning course titled *Records Management 101*. This course was developed in conjunction with the Federal Records Officer Network and is available for use by all Federal agencies. NRMT also developed several eLearning courses for the Consumer Finance Protection Bureau, supported the Records Management and Information Management Training Program at Haskell University, continued development of an online Sustainable Formats and Permanent Electronic Records Course, and published new videos of *The Case for Records Management: Issues for Federal Agency Counsel.* 

The NRMT began a series of projects to continue modernization of the training program, collecting and analyzing data to determine the records management training needs for various segments of the Federal workforce.

### Prologue: Quarterly of the National Archives and Records Administration

*Prologue* magazine published four issues in FY 2015. Prologue continues to sell subscriptions and single copies through the online retailer Zinio.

- Winter 2014 Highlighted the latest temporary exhibit in the National Archives Building, *Spirited Republic: Alcohol in American History*, and noted the 70th anniversary of World War II's he Battle of the Bulge.
- Spring 2015 Told the stories of two famous frauds: a serial claimant of Civil War medals and pensions he did not earn and a Gold Rush cashier who skimmed a fortune off of unwitting Yukon miners.
- Summer 2015 Shared the inspiring stories of American doctors in post-WWII Philippines, First Lady Lou Hoover's small act of grace that set off a racial firestorm in 1929, and three Monuments *Women*" who risked their careers to return to their rightful owners artwork looted by the Nazis in WWII.
- Fall 2015 Honored the Presidency of Eisenhower on the 125th anniversary of his birth.



### **Presidential Libraries**

A synopsis for Center for Legislative Archives and Presidential Library activities are highlighted in this section.

### **Center for Legislative Archives**



In FY 2015, the eBook *Congress Creates the Bill of Rights* was downloaded from iTunes and archvies.gov over 500 times, and the iOS and Android apps were downloaded more than 5,600 time. *Congress Creates the Bill of Rights* consists of three elements: an eBook, a mobile app for tablets, and online resources for teachers and students. Each provides a distinct way of exploring how the First Congress proposed amendments to the Constitution in 1789.

#### Herbert Hoover

- Three temporary exhibits opened in this period: A Shakespeare Christmas, The Signature of Baseball featuring the Randy Kaplan collection of baseballs signed by 182 world leaders, and The Making of the Great Humanitarian: Herbert Hoover and World War I.
- An academic conference, *The Humanitarian Awakening*, highlighting themes in the exhibit was televised by C-SPAN.



### Franklin D. Roosevelt

- A new exhibition, *Spirit of the Gift: Gifts of State and Affection* opened. It showcases some of the most interesting state gifts received by President Roosevelt.
- The Dutchess County Veteran's Association held its *Veterans Appreciation Day*. Nearly 400 former service members and their families were on hand to hear words of tribute, enjoy refreshments and music, tour the historic site and obtain information on the benefits and services available to them.
- The Eleanor Roosevelt Leadership Center and the United Nations Association, Southern New York State Division presented *Human Rights: The World We Want* in honor of Human Rights Day.

## What We Did (continued)

### Presidential Libraries (continued)

#### Dwight D. Eisenhower

- The 2015 Kansas Geographic Bee was held March 27. An audience of approximately 450 attended, including the top 100 Kansas geography students in grades 4-8.
- The exhibits World War II Remembered: Battles, Leaders and Heroes and Be Ye Men of Valor: Allies of World War II continue through December 31, 2016.




• The highly acclaimed Salina Symphony performed an outdoor D-Day commemorative concert at the Eisenhower Presidential Library and Museum on June 6. The concert drew a crowd of over 3000.

#### John F. Kennedy

- The exhibit galleries at the Library reopened in April after technology and design upgrades were done. The project included overhauling and adding to the existing museum infrastructure and creating an interactive/dynamic experience for visitors.
- The Library partnered with NASA to host a mobile *Museum on Wheels* that included interactive exhibits, hands-on activities, and a talk by astronaut Clay Anderson.
- A collaboration with the National Archives of Japan yielded a Special Exhibit on President Kennedy. Unveiled in Tokyo, *JFK: His Life and Legacy* highlights President Kennedy's service in World War II, his relationship with Japan, and his accomplishments in the White House.

#### **Richard M. Nixon**



- Play Ball! Presidents and Baseball Nixon was a lifelong baseball fan.
   During his post-presidential years he wrote personal letters to some of his favorite players, and several will be on display for the first time.
- Suited for Space uses stunning photographs, X-Rays showing the spacesuit's interior workmanship and artifacts to describe nearly a century of spacesuit design and development, from the earliest high-altitude pressure suits to the iconic white suits of Apollo and Skylab.
- Read my Pins: The Madeleine Albright Collection The exhibition showcases over 200 distinctive jewelry items worn by Secretary Madeleine K. Albright to communicate a message during her diplomatic tenure.

## Presidential Libraries (continued)

### Gerald R. Ford

- The Grand Rapids area cultural institutions joined together for *Free 4 All*; an annual event where families can come downtown and experience the uniqueness of each museum for free. Over 1,000 people came from the local area to take part.
- ArtPrize Seven, the world's largest prize money art competition, began September 23 and closed on October 11. The Ford Presidential Museum hosted 30 artists. Loveless Photofiber took the People's Choice Award. Over 1,500 artists took part in the competition.



### **Jimmy Carter**

- War from the Victims' Perspective, Photographs by Jean Mohr opened to commemorate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the International Committee of the Red Cross
- A visiting group from the U.S. China Friendship Association, the Carter Center's Board of Councilors, and local teachers attended a pre-opening viewing of the exhibition *The People's China: Village Life by Master Photographer Zeng Yi*.
- During the FY 2015 school year, 7,976 students from 112 schools visited the museum. Of these, 3,280 students received guided tours and 1,289 participated in special programs.

### **Ronald Reagan**

• Amazing Automobiles: The Ultimate Car Exhibit – The exhibit had three sections which featured Hollywood Cars that had appeared in television shows, Wow Cars that are particularly rare and featured innovative designs, and State Cars that had been owned by various Heads of state.





- A California Christmas The exhibit featured trees that reflected various sites and cities in the state. The White House Christmas tree was on display.
- Football! The Exhibition at the Reagan Library The 5,000 square foot exhibit features more than 500 artifacts documenting the history of the game, including game worn jerseys, examples of equipment that reflect the evolution of the game, trading cards, three Heisman Trophies, Super Bowl Rings, and many more items.

## Presidential Libraries (continued)

### George H. W. Bush

- *History in the Making: Texas A&M Forest Service*, celebrates a century of service to the citizens of Texas by examining how the agency evolved from forest conservation, management, fire prevention, and protection.
- The Education Department hosted a *Reading Discovery* distance learning program and videoconference featuring Mrs. Barbara Bush reading to and taking questions from more than 170,000 students.
- The *Exploring History* summer camp aligned with the exhibit on the Texas A&M Forest Service. Participants learned about the sounds of the forest, how to read a tree cookie, forest fire safety, the benefits of a forest and forest products.

### William J. Clinton

- In honor of the 65th Anniversary of Charles Schulz's *Peanuts* cartoon strip, the Clinton Library simultaneously hosted two traveling exhibits: *Pigskin in Peanuts* and *Heartbreak in Peanuts*.
- The world premiere of D*inosaurs* Around the World opened in April 2015. This exhibit featured 13 lifesized dinosaurs and an area chronicling the accomplishments of U.S. Presidents who acted to preserve the fossil-rich areas where dinosaurs once roamed.



### George W. Bush



The Library hosted the special exhibits, *Christmas at the White House 2002* and *Baseball: America's Presidents, America's Pastime*.

The Presidential Biography and Memoirs series presented a wide variety of scholars talking about Presidents and the Office of the Presidency. The Library engaged a wide variety of constituencies, and provided information on the highest office in our land. The Library hosted an American history teachers' seminar that focused on examining the American Presidency after the Cold War. Teachers from across the region came for an intense one-week course.

# *Trust Fund Notes to Financial Statements and Explanations of Significant Accounting Policies*

These financial statements are derived from the financial records maintained by the Department of Treasury, Bureau of Public Debt on behalf of the NATF and from NARA's consolidated financial statements for FY 2015 audited by CliftonLarsonAllen LLP. NARA's consolidated financial statements are available at: <u>http://go.usa.gov/cTd6P</u>.

**Revenue:** Revenue is derived from the sale of publications, reproductions of records, self-service electrostatic copies, store merchandise sales, website merchandise sales, Records Management Training, Presidential Library museum admissions and events, and investment income. Revenues are recorded on an accrual basis.

**Investment Valuation:** Investments in Federal securities are made daily and are reported at cost. The National Archives also employs the use of a third party capital management firm to monitor and manage the endowments, received pursuant to Title 44 U.S.C. § 2112, for the George H. W. Bush Library, Clinton Library, and George W. Bush Library. The purpose of the endowment is to provide income to offset the operations and maintenance costs of the corresponding Presidential library. Each endowment is reflected as a separate investment account. The National Archives continues to exercise its authority under Title 44 U.S.C. § 2306, to invest funds for the Presidential Libraries with a third party investment firm, The Vanguard Group.

All third party investments with Vanguard are classified as trading equity securities which have readily determinable fair values and are measured at fair value in the balance sheet. Unrealized holding gains and losses, as well as interest income earned are recognized in earnings on a monthly basis.

**Inventory Valuation:** The NATF inventories, which consist of merchandise held for sale, are stated at the lower of cost or market value, with cost determined using the average cost method. An allowance for damaged and obsolete goods is based on historical analysis and an evaluation of inventory turnover from year to year. Expenses are recorded when the inventories are sold.

**Property and Equipment Valuation and Depreciation:** Fixed assets are shown at original acquisition cost less accumulated depreciation. The capitalized cost of these assets is allocated over the estimated useful life by the straight-line method.

**Deferred Revenue:** The current liability for deferred revenue represents advance payments for products and services that are to be furnished within a year.

The information provided within these financial reports includes business activity that was not material to the balances reported in our audited financial reports.

## **Snapshot of Donations**

#### Overview

The Gift Fund is administered by the NATFB and accepts, receives, holds, and administers -- in accordance with the terms of the donor -- gifts or bequests of money, securities, or other personal property for the benefit of National Archives activities. In FY 2015, new donations of more than \$1.3 million were received.

#### General, Cultural, and Archival Gifts

The General, Cultural, and Archival Gift Fund received more than \$987,000 in donations during the year, including \$927,000 donated by the National Archives Foundation, to fund various digitization projects.

#### **Office of Research Services**

The Office of Research Services received \$62 in donations in support of the activities of the research archives system.

#### **Presidential Libraries**

Total donations to the Presidential libraries amounted to more than \$397,000.The Ronald Reagan Library received \$189,000 in donations to support the Situation Room project. The Ford Library received \$73,000, principally from the Gerald R Ford Foundation. The George W Bush Library received more than \$33,000 from supporting foundations.
