MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD:

SUBJECT: Procurement of Intelligence by
 (Mrs. Dorothy L. Hunt)

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1. On 25 February 1963, I delivered to Mr. W. Lloyd
 of a memorandum and
 a 14 of transmittal and 20 February respectively.
 Both were prepared by Ambassador Antonio Garrigues for
 Prince Stanislas Radziwill and taken to the latter in New
 York by Alfonso de Borbon, 1st Secretary of the Spanish
 Embassy in Washington.

2. The purpose of the material was to enlist the
 aid of Radziwill in (a) persuading the President to visit
 Madrid during his next European trip, and (b) conveying
 to the President the views of Ambassador Garrigues regard-
 ing U. S. - Latin American relations.

3. Mr. George regarded the material too sensitive
 to be handled by routine means, and decided to show it
 only to Mr. Helms.

4. On 27 February 1963, Mr. George telephoned me
 to say that he had just shown the material to Mr. Helms
 who speculated whether he ought not take it to the White
 House at once. Mr. George demurred, pointing out the
 sensitivity of the source (my wife), whereupon Mr. Helms
 indicated that nothing should be done with the material
 until Mr. George returned from a Far East trip and could
 consider the matter further.

5. Mr. George then asked Mr. Helms whether (my wife)
 should register under the Foreign Agents Registration
 Act, and Mr. Helms said that under the circumstances she
 absolutely should not.

**SUBJECT: Procurement of Intelligence by
Mrs. Dorothy L. Hunt**

1. On 23 February 1963, I delivered to Mr. W. Lloyd George, Chief, FI, three copies of a memorandum and a letter of transmittal dated 18 and 20 February respectively. Both were prepared by Ambassador Antonio Garrigues for Prince Stanislas Radziwill and taken to the latter in New York by Alfonso de Burton, 2d Secretary of the Spanish Embassy in Washington.

2. The purpose of the material was to enlist the aid of Radziwill in (a) persuading the President to visit Madrid during his next European trip, and (b) conveying to the President the views of Ambassador Garrigues regarding U. S. - Latin American relations.

3. Mr. George regarded the material too sensitive to be handled by routine means, and decided to show it only to Mr. Helms.

4. On 27 February 1963, Mr. George telephoned me to say that he had just shown the material to Mr. Helms who speculated whether he ought not take it to the White House at once.
