SUBJECT : Neeting with Norman actions and David M. McCONNELL

REFERENCE: 1 Your Gral Directive of Thursday, 29 June 1961

1. On Thursday, 29 June 1961, I met with Norman RUTHMAN and David McCONNELL in the office of the Deputy Attorney General to evaluate, per your directive, Mr. ROTHMAN's claim to operational assets inside Cuba and elsewhere in the Caribbean area. The moeting insted from 1600 to 1830 hours. It was agreed by the participants of this meeting that Mr. ROTHMAN would return to Miami on Friday, 30 June, and that Mr. McCONNELL would telephone me at the office of the Deputy Attorney General on Wednesday, 5 July, for our evaluation of Mr. ROTHMAN's operational potential in Cuban affairs.

2. Mr. McCONNELL requested to meet with me privately in the conference room. He advised me that he was a leading political figure in the Democratic Party machine in North Carolina, that he was acquainted with numerous Government figures in Washington (including Robert Kennedy, General Taylor, and General Tan Fleet), that he was a corporate tax lawyer who was doing very well in his home town of Charlotte, North Carolina, and that he was concerned over the embarrassment to the Kennedy administration caused by the Cuban "fiasco." He further advised me that his interest in this case was that of an American anxious to fight Communism in the Western Regisphere and to ensure that the U.S. Government made maximum use of operational potential as represented in the person and claims of Mr. ROTHMAN. Mr. McCONNELL noted that, according to RCTHMAN's story, ROTHMAN had assets and capabilities. which would enable him (ROTHMAN) to destroy the arms dumps on the plantation of ex-President CARDENAS of Mexico, to set up operational bases in the Yucatan at a cost of \$50 to \$1,000, to sabotage targets in Cuba identified by the U.S. Government, and to provide positive intelligence on the activities of Chinese Communist groups in the Western Hemisphere.

- 3. I used the points listed by Mr. McCONNELL to debrief
 Mr. ROTHMAN on his claims of assets which can be used against
 Cubs and other targets in the Western Hemisphere. Mr. ROTHMAN
 told me that he was an American citizen, born on 26 December 1914,
 at New York City, that he runs the bar in the Bel Air Rotel,
 Miami, Florida, that he was furmerly the owner of "Sans Souci,"
 a nightclub in Havana, and that he lived at 425 Surfside Boulevard
 in Miami, Florida. During the interview Mr. ROTHMAN, when questioned
 on those points of potential listed by Mr. McCONNELL above, made
 the following statements:
 - a. He is a dedicated anti-Communist and is particularly interested in working against CASTRO who executed three of his class, dear friends. When asked for the names of these friends, Mr. ROTHMAN was not able to give these in full.

 After ten minutes, he named these friends as Rogelic CONZALEZ (war name "Francisco"); Sori MARIN; and Efigenic FERNANDEZ.
 - b He has an operational capability to destroy arms dumps which he claims are located on the finca of ex-President CARDENAS of Mexico. He has contact with agent assets located in Mexico through cartain Mexican friends whom he refused to identify. He added that he had made contact as recently as four to five months age with these Mexican friends.
 - c. He is very familiar with the terrain and people of the Tucatan peninsula. When asked for the date of his last visit to the Tucatan, he said that he had been there for two days at some time in 1959. He added that he had constructed an air strip at some point in the Tucatan which was capable of taking two B-26's and two P-51's. He said that no one knows of the location or existence of this particular air strip. When asked who had built the strip and when it was built, Mr. ROTHMAN said that the strip had been built by Indian Indian friends would know of its existence, he said that they were loyal to him and that so one in the provincial or national governments of Mexico knew of this strip. When asked if a plane had ever landed on this strip, Mr. ROTHMAN said that one B-26 had landed there. When asked how he managed to provide fuel and maintenance for aircraft located at this strip, Mr. RCTHMAN was not able, or chose not, to give an exact reply.

- d. He is well acquainted with Sanchez ARANGO. He said that he meets frequently with ARANGO and considers him a good personal friend. When questioned, Mr. ROTHMAN said that he had last met Mr. ARANGO six weeks ago. He was not able to give the home address of Mr. ARANGO. He said that he would be able to produce Mr. ARANGO in Washington at request.
- e. Mr. ROTHMAN said that he had the personnel and capabilities to attack or sabotage any target of our choosing in Guba. He said that he had a basic plan for the assassination of Fidel CASTRO. He said that his plan called for an air attack with napalm against CASTRO at a time when the Prime Minister was addressing one of his rallies in Hawana. He said that he had one hundred pilots who had participated in the invasion of Cuba and who were now asking employment as flyers for the Congolese Air Force. He refused to identify any of the pilots by name. When it was pointed out to him that the names of those pilots asking employment in the Congo were a matter of piblic record, he said that those pilots in whom he was particularly interested were not making application for such employment.
- f. He said that he had many agents going in and out of Cuba. When asked how many agents he controlled, Mr. ROTHMAN was not able to give an exact figure. When he was asked how many agents he sent into Cuba during the last year, he was not able to give an exact figure. When asked how many agents he was in contact with this date, Mr. ROTRMAN gave the figure of six. When I asked how these agents were able to : travel back and forth in view of the difficulties in making frequent visits to Cuba, Mr. ROTRMAN said that his agents were in the tourist travel bureaus or in export-import businesses, and entered the States via third countries. When asked at what date he had last had contact with these agents, Mr. HOTHMAN was not able to give an exact date. Mr. ROTHMAN said that with these unnamed assets above, he had the capability to make money exchanges between the United States and Cuba, and offered to be of service to the U.S. Government in any requirement along this line.
- g. He said that he knew of many Chinese Communists going into Canada from Cuba. When saked to identify the source of this information and the names of these Chinese, Mr. RCTHMAN said that he had not brought any record information with him and did not feel he could be asked to produce his factual data at this time.

- i. He said that he was a close friend of John Abbes Garcia, Chief of the Dominican Republic Security. He said that his last visit to the Dominican Republic was in 1959. He said that he had access to people in the Dominican Republic. He did not identify further these assets nor did he identify the means of communication to them.

I. At the conclusion of the interview with Mr. ROTHMIN, Mr. McCONNEIL asked to see me privately. During this interview, Mr. McCONNEIL again emphasized that his interest in this case was simply that of a good American who was interested in fighting Communism. Mr. McCONNEIL said that, in his opinion, an individual with Mr. ROTHMIN's character and background certainly should be useful in the gloves-off fight against Communism. He felt that, it might be to the national interest to make use of Mr. ROTHMAN against CASTRO and against Communism in the Western Hemisphere, and give precedence to this use over any intent to prosecute Mr. ROTHMAN for violations of Federal laws. Again Mr. McCONNEIL named his acquaintances in the Department of Defense, in the Department of Justice and in the White House. He added, at this time, that he was entertaining the thought of entering the administration in some official capacity.

5. Comment: Mr. ROTHMAN did not satisfy me that he has are centrals those agent and material assets to which he lays claim. I do not believe it is in the interest of the U.S. Government to further discuss with Mr. ROTHMAN these particular claims. I believe that Mr. White should be advised of our evaluation of Mr. ROTHMAN's claims immediately. I also believe that Mr. White of a representative from the Department of Justice should advise Mr. ROTHMAN that the Government is not satisfied with Mr. ROTHMAN alaims and has, indeed, information which negates such claims.
