- (4) Though requested by Mexico Station, Dep. asked the Navy for a photo of H.O., but did not permit and secure a photo before the 22<sup>nd</sup>.
  - (5) Mexico Station did not match the 1st main intercept with its earlier intercept (of 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> Sept) until after the 22<sup>nd</sup> Nov. event, when it did so with alacrity.
