1. On 3 June 1969 (fallowing arrangements made in Havana, Cuba two weeks earlier by the wateredgaed), Mas June Coli arrived in New York City for a series of nostings and possible recruitment as a contact of the all Division.

- 2. Originally esheduled to errive Pricay evening 3 hay, Miss this arrived early friday morning, having left Havana the previous uight, travelling by way of Missi. This emplicated matters sees-hat since riss CODE was not fully informed of the true reason for our asking her to come to lies fork. As a recult, she made consect with a few pao, le sham we would have rather not have had her see prior to sur contact with hor. homes of all persons contacted in Rew Tork are contained in a separate memorandum based on a debrisfing carried out in seculnytes on 6 June 1960. She also lo solle in Hew York, and attempted to Contacted find out about me from him. He had been briefed by me warlier in the week, bovever, and merely referred to no as a "friend" with many contacts in newspaper field and in government circles. Miss Cuib and a se "heary Rubbaer and as far as I know, she has no knowledge of my real name.
- 3. My first contact with Miss CubB was made in havens, Cube on 28 Harch 1960. We met in the coffee shop of the navana hillon notel where I Hy cover at the time was introduced to her by of L was that my visit to Havens was being sponsored by "Girman and reach newsaper interests, leaving seasonat vague my specific aponsors. Miss will did not invulve about me any further at that time and was helpful in getting appointments for me and Mr. Claus Jacobia a legitimate German correspondent of "Der Spiegel", with certain Cuben officials. ... o met a ain several times during my stay in herana san found her a women with many contacts among loaders of the acvolutionary movement. Before leaving Cuba I set her for dinner in an attempt to evaluate her possible usefulness to us but made no further effort toward a recruitment.
- 4. After returning to Hoodquarters and discussing her strategic position within the hierarchy of the nevolutionaries, Chief an and Chief wH/4 orined that a recruitment attempt should be made in view of the increasing interest in the activities of the Cuben government.
- 5. On 20 May 1960 on emether trip to Havena, Miss was was again cortacted and after two meetings was asked to come to hem Tork. At no time in my discussions with her was CIA named or inforred. In navana I talked

to her about her "fature" and said that I had been comestat impressed by her fluency in "panish and shility to "get around". I asked her if she had an interest in coming to hem. Terk and discussing an employment possibility which sould make use of her talents. In anser to her inquiries as to what she would have to do, I vaguely referred to reporting and articing and possibly some public relations activity. She agreed to come and I advanced her \$180.00 to purchase her plane tickets.

- 6. The question of "leave" to come to how fork was brought up for I told her that I didn't want her to get into difficulties with her office. She said that she was pretty much her own boss and would find an alle gets excuse. Later we decided that I would send her a telegram in the name of her father from New York telling her that father would be in her fork for a few days and would like to see her. The believed that this would be a good excuse because all her close high level friends including her boss with know that the is very attached to her father and then the some fork sould be somey from time to time. I also taked whether her going to be fork sould create any suspicious on the part of the rollies or coverity possit. The was sure it wouldn't because of the rather high rate of reaffic by Johan officials to and from new York, the thought biasi would be corresponded to the honestly falt that her York would be the most to give place for her to go.
- 7. Hiss Cobb told we she has an office on the sighth floor of the flack building inchevans which is the same building and same from the flace Collider when his office. The has a secretary and a private ordice, the principal task is that of public relations vis-s-vis anglish speaking countries. The also does translations of hemograper and magnature transplants for flack. Miss cold, an American citizen employed by the cuban herolutionary Coverment, is a difficult type of person to characterize, attending from the borth American midwest, she left home in her early twenties and has been restless and more or less "homeless" ever since, the is "bohedian" as a type, and her life with latin Americans of all walks of life noncomed her considerably and has removed much of the momenthness and which from their considerably and has removed much of the momenthness and which from their considerably and has removed nuch of the momenthness and what from their confused. In me langer many that the hereletionary movement and use of idealistically nativated for a few months ago is the right thing, and useful her contact with us, had made up her mind to leave Caba in the near fature. Her accordance with fifel Contro and execurage has been mother, shattered "dress", one of a whole perion in her life. As a result, I do not feel she is as "ideal" agost but in view of the lack of contacts in the avvolutionary movement and the fact that she is a number of the efficial group, I feel she can be of use and can be made to pass information and material to us.

9. One of the most difficult problems with hiss OUBB will be control. She has shown good conspiratorial sense which at first surprised me comenhation after learning more of her back, ownd and past activities (long illicit leve affair and engaged in dope traffic) it is probably by now second mature to her. She will also need considerable stearing toward interdiffence targets. Although she sits in the midst of memorous activities of intelligence interest her own personal interests until new have been along vestly different lines and much of her past activity with the newolutionary government has been guided by emotion and idealism. She is enthusiastic and is liable to take her first intelligence assignments with some differentian, not purposefully but as a result of her "collaborating" with a United States service of some stature against a fonce she once firmly believed in but lately has been turning against buch se of failure to materialize along the idealistic lines she originally anticipated.

10. Miss C.Bb also has very few materialistic also or desires. Money means almost nothing to her as is indicated in the report on her destricting. Of the each advanced her for a round trip ticket to new York also jurclassed a one way ticket and used the other to pay off detts. This thought nothing whotsoever of this and apparently obtains and spends money without a true realization of its value. The lives over her income of approximately live peace (equivalent to dollars) a month, making up the difference by hancouts from friends or, if she is really caught short, by having her father send her money.

Il. While in New York, several meetings were held with her and she was gradually indoctrinated to the fact that my interests in her were of an intelligence nature. Cla was never mentioned in our if our sions yet at one point she said she suspected I must be from the because no other government agency operates outside of the United States and her past experience with the FEI was of a nature to indicate that they always ask her to visit them at their offices. (She was questioned once on a trip to hew York in connection with the Harita LOHENZ case.)

12. while in New York discussing her potential with her, it was obvious that her complex background, present activities, vest circus of friends and her unstable character would call for a more thorough debriefing. She agreed to come to mashington with me to "see and talk to a friend for a technical evaluation of her ability to act securely" and on 6 June 1960 she arrived at the hotel Blackstone in "amington registering as anneuell misson. Arrangements were made with Al/A/Cl to have her polygraphed to which she agreed. That evening she was taken to the Botol haleigh where an extensive debriefing and evaluation of her was made. The results of this debriefing including a chronology of her activities and past history are contained in a separate contained.

13. Pellowing the pelygraph, Mice CCEB planted to return to New York and Howes but due to the length of time that the emmination required, she stayed in machington wall the norming of 7 July. She departed for New at 8:00 A.H. and left that evening for Harman. Cuba. She obtained information

of a CI nature before leaving and managed to puss it on to an through leaver of before her departure. This information consormed activities of a Coben agent in Missia.

It. Hiss COBS was teld prier to her departure that if she was sincere in wanting to aid and assist us in obtaining factual information about current activities in Cabs, she would have to be completely honest and subject herself to some control. The was given a few targets to concentrate on until our beat meeting as an attempt to evaluate her ability along these lines. The was asked to obtain news and contacts of Joviet and satellite citizens dealing with the Revolutionary government. She was taked to see the Chief of grands with the Revolutionary government. Also, she was told to try to determine what humes disting accomplished on his visit to the toviet union. 15. At first 1 was planning to go to haven to establish a local contact, however, just before her departure Miss. And suggested that she make another trip to how York around 1 July and to include the matter of a local contact, if advisable, at that time. I believe that the havens station should determine if they want to have local access to Miss Code and her activities. If Miss Code can be controlled and accepts stating, it would perhaps be desirable to mould her into a long range asset by having her become very copy with the Commandst leaders and become, overthy, even more "radia" about the revolutionary movement. Later she could perhaps be used electrice in Letin America, probably among the rabid left sing youth groups that are becoming increasingly anti-American and more powerful in various areas.

Ide would appreciate any comments the havana station may have concerning where and how to establish contact with her locally. In feel that her usefulness has current need and she may be able to hands many on the apot assignments for the local station. The does need direction and that too could best be handled locally. Her next visit to her fork has already been laid on by her physician friend who will request her to visit the city for "treatment" before the doctor departs for surope on an extended trip. Wiss COBS was informed that if her services are considered unclui, so will pay her a sum of 200 Cuban peace a month. The appreciation of dishonesty on her part would oreak the relationship. The sum of 200 peace was suggested after discussing the matter of componention with a senior member of the livens. Station
